



### FUND COMMENTARY

A fast-moving banking confidence crisis diverted investor focus from the long-running inflation narrative and put a dent in any notion of a more hawkish move from the US Federal Reserve – anchoring general market sentiment that the Fed will be cutting rates before the year's end. Closures of Silicon Valley Bank and Signature Bank, and capital issues at Credit Suisse and First Republic have raised concerns about the state of the industry. While big banks are considered well capitalized, smaller institutions have faced liquidity crunches due to the rapidly rising interest rates that have created unrealized losses on the books. Silicon Valley, for instance, had to realize and sell bonds at a loss due to withdrawals and a slowdown in new deposits, triggering a crisis of confidence and a run on the bank. The Fed and other regulators stepped in with emergency measures that seem to have stemmed immediate funding concerns. The moves were designed to prevent any further failures by easing fears of large losses among uninsured big depositors. This significantly impacted the implied policy rate expectations priced in by market participants. The implied policy rate expectations priced in as at the end of March which now indicates that the market thinks the Fed will hike 25 basis points just once more, before aggressively cutting rates within the next year.

These repricing's have created wild swings in the bond market. The Move Index, a yield curve weighted index of the normalized implied volatility on 1-month Treasury options is extremely elevated and has recently been at levels last seen during the 2020 Covid-19 pandemic, 2008 GFC and 2000 Tech bubble. A combination of uncertainty in the bond market and the possibility of rate cuts in the US makes for a strong case for growth assets over fixed income globally. That said, global equities are sitting on extremely unattractive valuation multiples, even after the strong selloff of 2022. This while emerging market equities offer reasonably attractive valuation metrics makes a strong case for a rotation into emerging market risk.

The US Fed went ahead and raised interest rates by 25 basis points last month to increase the target range to 4.75%-5%, expressing caution about the recent banking crisis and indicating that hikes are nearing an end. This marks its ninth hike since March of last year. The Fed also noted that future increases are not assured despite market pricing to the contrary and will depend largely on incoming data. Across the Atlantic, the European Central Bank hiked 50 basis points, while the Bank of England lifted rates by just 25 basis points despite the country stil battling with double digit inflation prints.

Global equity markets ended the month positive, as volatility subsided towards month-end. The MSCI World gained +3.1%, while its emerging market counterpart added +3.0%, and US Treasuries gained +2.9%

Over the course of the quarter the MSCI World returned +7.7%, the MSCI Emerging Markets Index +4.0%, the S&P500 gained +3.7% and US Bonds were up +3.0%.

### GLOSSARY

Annualised performance: Annualised performance shows longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest performance: The highest and lowest performance for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

Current Yield: Annual income (interest or dividends) divided by the current price of the security.

CPU: Cents Per Unit to the Glossary

Alpha: Denotes the outperformance of the fund over the benchmark.

Sharpe Ratio: The Sharpe ratio is used to indicate the excess return the portfolio delivers over the risk free rate per unit of risk adopted by the fund.

Standard Deviation: The deviation of the return stream relative to its own average.

Max Drawdown: The maximum peak to trough loss suffered by the Fund since inception.

Max Gain: Largest increase in any single month.

% Positive Month: The percentage of months since inception where the Fund has delivered positive return.

### **Fund Specific Risks**

Default Risk: The risk that the issuers of fixed income instruments may not be able to meet interest payments nor repay the money they have borrowed. The issuers credit quality is vital. The worse the credit quality, the greater the risk of default and therefore investment loss.
